

ALTERNATIVE SPRING BREAK 2010 (Returner Application)

MISSION:

Alternative Spring Break (ASB) is a unique opportunity for students to dedicate their spring break to doing community service. ASB often immerses students in communities they are unfamiliar with to do work they have never done before. *This makes for an intense cultural, educational and personal experience.* The philosophy driving ASB is that it is not enough to simply provide service but that one must seriously examine why that service is necessary in the first place. Of course, ASB is not all work and no play. Having fun and forming friendships are major parts of ASB. Pre-trip meetings, fundraising efforts, service and reflection bring students close together and provide daily opportunities to get to know new people and have a good time.

THE VALUE OF ASB LIES IN ITS ABILITY TO:

- Expand students' worldviews
- Deepen students' sense of civic responsibility
- Encourage students to embrace and celebrate diversity
- Challenge students to break down the stereotypes they unconsciously cling to
- Put students in an environment where they are working with others who may be very different from themselves
- Help students connect what they are learning in the classroom to the world at large

In addition to community service, **reflection** is another essential element. Reflection activities facilitate how students process the experiences they are having. Reflection is the primary catalyst used to help students connect what they are doing during ASB to the bigger picture. By providing time for students to ask themselves such questions as, *“Why am I doing community service? Why does this matter? How is this trip affecting me?”*, students are able to think more deeply about the underlying issues present in the service they are providing.

TRIP INFORMATION (PLEASE REVIEW THE WEBSITES CAREFULLY):

This year we will be running three trips, which **will leave on Saturday, March 13th and return on Saturday, March 20th**. These trips are run by Team Leaders who were selected based upon their experience, leadership ability and enthusiasm for the program. One faculty/staff Learning Partner will also attend each trip. Please contact the appropriate Team Leader with any questions that are specific to a particular trip.

- **Appalachian South Folk Life Center** (Pipestem, WV): This trip, lead by Danielle Castellano (dc283123@wnec.edu), will focus on assisting with home repair for senior citizens and those who have physical disabilities. Participants could assist with such projects as roofing, painting or putting up sheet rock. Participants will also learn about Appalachian culture. Visit www.folklifecenter.org for more information.
- **Camp Vacamas** (West Milford, NJ): This trip, led by Abby Mastriano (am274926@wnec.edu), will focus on children and youth. Participants will assist with cleaning up and prepping the summer camp, and tutoring children in Newark and New York City. Visit www.vacamas.org for more information.
- **Shawnee National Forest** (Murphysboro, IL): This trip, led by Chris Nuhfer (cn286314@wnec.edu) will focus on issues surrounding environmental restoration and preservation. Participants will have the opportunity to engage in species and plant removal, work with archeologists, and assist with trail maintenance. ****ASB IS AN ALCOHOL AND DRUG FREE EXPERIENCE****

In order to achieve the goals and objectives of this program and maintain the safety, security, well-being and respect for the participants, teams, and communities we are serving, alcohol and drug use is NOT permitted on Alternative Spring Break, even if you are 21 years of age or older. Participants will be sent home, at their own expense, should they choose to not respect this aspect of the program, and will face judicial sanctions upon their return to Western New England College. NUTS & BOLTS

APPLICATION & REFERENCE INFORMATION:

Space is limited for this program and a maximum of **24** students will be selected. In addition to one Team Leader and one College Learning Partner per trip, the trips can accommodate **8** students. As a result, you will need to fill out an application, provided in this packet, and have a recommendation form submitted. The recommendation form must be completed by a high school teacher, professor, supervisor, staff member at Western New England College, or student leader at the College (i.e. PA, RA, FSA). **Friends or family members cannot serve as a reference.**

Read the application carefully and be thoughtful in your responses when completing it. **THE APPLICATION IS DUE ON FRIDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 2009 BY 4:30PM.** All applications must be turned in to Rose Gage in the Volunteer Connection Center (Campus Center, room 249B). *Late applications will only be considered space permitting.*

Rose Gage and the Team Leaders will review all applications. You will be notified by **Monday, November 23rd** regarding your status. If you have any questions regarding the application or the overall program, please contact Rose Gage at rgage@wnec.edu or at 413-782-1638.

IF ACCEPTED:

If you are selected to participate in the ASB program you will be expected to meet the following commitments:

- 1) All ASB participants must pay an initial **non-refundable** registration fee of \$100 that will go towards the overall cost of the trip. **Make checks payable to Western New England College.** This money is due to Rose Gage by **Monday, November 30, 2009.** Students who do not pay their registration fee by this date may lose their spot to those students who have been put on a waiting list. If you are unable to pay the registration fee by this date due to financial circumstances, please contact Rose.
- 2) The cost for each ASB trip varies according to the destination of each experience. The program is designed to assist students in covering the cost through fundraisers. You must be prepared to participate in both team and personal fundraisers. More information on trip costs will be available upon acceptance into the program.
- 3) A mandatory **ASB Orientation** is scheduled for **Saturday, January 23, 2010 from 11:00am to 4:00pm.** All students selected for ASB must participate in this orientation, **NO EXCEPTIONS.** The orientation is a critical time for us to build group dynamics and begin preparing for the experience.
- 4) You are expected to attend all **group meetings.** These meetings are designed to build team unity, teach participants about the issue they will be working with, along with the part of the country they will be working in, and discuss trip logistics, to name a few topics.
- 5) You are expected to attend a **pre-service project**, which will be organized by the Team Leader(s) of each trip. This experience will further educate you about the issue you will be exploring during ASB.

2. Your team leader wants to facilitate a nightly reflection session during ASB. Some team members start to complain and are very vocal about how they don't understand the importance of reflection. They start telling others that they are going to refuse to participate when the team leader pulls the group together for the first reflection session. How would you respond to these team members given your experience with reflection? What could you tell them that may encourage them to participate?

3. A team member who is 21 is constantly talking about wanting to get back to WNEC and drink. They keep complaining about not being able to drink while on ASB and can't understand why partying is inappropriate. Every evening they're talking about partying with your team when you return to campus, even though not everyone drinks. It is evident that some of the other team members are uncomfortable around this person. How do you handle the situation while supporting the team leader?
